Extreme methods of orchid culture

We may think that orchids require very specific growing conditions. However, if one looked closely at orchids in the wild - these plants often grow in very extreme conditions.

Malcolm started this talk showing a picture of Eria spirodela growing in Laos on a rock with no sun protection or growth medium around the roots.

The plant received not a drop of rain for months, yet the plant looked well developed with multiple growths.

Another picture showed Aerides

ringens growing on a dead tree at the top of the canopy, again with no



protection

from the sun with leaves red and shriveled and yet the plant had multiple flower spikes. Another one he showed was a Dendrobium growing on pure limestone, where it was misty, cold and wet throughout the year.

Orchid growers tend to use different methods of culture that are suited to their environment but maybe they should take a leaf from nature and try a method that is more extreme??

Malcolm introduced different growing mediums he brought along: clay granules, tufa, acadama (bonsai growing medium) and builder's vermiculite which a friend of his uses extensively.

This friend does everything differently from everybody else but grows plants to specimen size using extreme

methods which seem to work very well for him as is shown by the many awards he has won.

He has a 48ft long greenhouse that is unshaded with vents that are open throughout the year. He never sprays or waters his plants over the top as they are all standing in paddling pools.

His plants are standing in two trays: one with holes - another filled with vermiculite. He mainly grows Cattleyas but also likes to grow miniature water lilies and pineapples.

He ignores modern publications and seeks out very old ones as he believes the best advice is found there.

Malcolm mainly grows Coelogynes and Bulbophyllums which are all standing in water throughout the year.

He brought Bulbophyllum monstrabile growing in live sphagnum in a potting

tray that stands in water and it was growing extremely well. In the Philippines this plant



grows in swamps,

He suggested that we all try and grow plants from June to November standing in water, just to see the difference in the growth spurs they will achieve. After all this is only replicating monsoon conditions.

He concluded by stating that there is no right or wrong way of growing orchids - it's finding what suits one's conditions the best for the species grown. *Lina Smalinske*
