RHS Orchid Trophy

Most of you have probably not heard of the RHS Orchid Trophy. The Trophy is awarded each year to the best orchid presented to the RHS Orchid Committee during the last year. I am pleased to inform you that your Chairman, Malcolm, was awarded this Trophy for his Paphiopedilum Fumi's Delight "Bob Moodie"CCC/RHS which was also awarded Best in Show at our Spring Show in 2022.

Malcolm was delighted to have won awards with this plant which was aptly named after his father who got him into growing orchids, evidently quite reluctantly.

Malcolm and Andrea were notified about the award in January but were

sworn to secrecy and had to wait until Monday 6th March to attend the awards ceremony and lunch at the RHS Lindley Hall, Vincent Square in Westminster.

He collected a lovely, engraved glass bowl which was presented by Keith Weed, President of the Royal Horticultural Society in front of some of the great and good of the horticultural world who were either there as hosts or to receive awards of their own for excellence in horticulture. I am sure you will join with me in congratulating Malcolm on his superb plant and much deserved award.



On 4th March 2023, we welcomed Leif Bersweden who gave a talk about his quest to find all 52 of Britain's wild orchid species in one season.

Impressively, Leif embarked upon his orchid adventure as a teenager on his



gap year between school and university. He kept detailed log books of his travels and subsequently published his first book The Orchid Hunter in 2017. Like many of us, Leif's passion for nature began during his childhood. He told us about how his father particularly

encouraged this interest and he quickly became interested in the minutiae of nature, enjoying examining insect specimens up close in jam jars.

A page in Leif's childhood wildflower guide highlighting some of Britain's wild orchids sparked his interest in wild orchids and he began searching for them in his school holidays. This eventually resulted in Leif's plan to spend a gap year attempting to see all of Britain's wild orchid species within a single season. Leif then told us about some of the

highlights of his orchid adventure. He travelled to Kent to see the Man Orchid (Orchis Italica), typically the eighth flowering species in the year. The Man Orchid is aptly named due to



the clusters of small flowers which look like tiny little men wearing nothing but their birthday suits. He went on to talk to us about his favourite orchid, the Bee **Orchid** (Ophrys apifera), which commonly flowers in June and Julv. He described



how the Bee Orchid has evolved to exploit the sexual desire of male bees. The flower of the bee orchid looks and smells like a female bee which entices the male bee to land on it. The male bee will gather pollen onto the back of his head as he attempts to mate with the flower. When he eventually abandons the attempt and flies off, the male bee subsequently spots a different population of bee orchids and will fall for the same trick all over again. He will land on a new flower, depositing the pollen from the back of his head onto the new plant. Leif described how much he enjoys ingenious interactions like this between plants and animals.

Finally, Leif told us about his attempts to see the Coralroot Orchid (Corallorhiza) in Newcastle. His quest very nearly failed at this point after various disasters including a broken down car leading to a motorway stranding. However, Leif's father saved the day after driving him many hours all the way back to Newcastle to enable him to see this orchid.

Leif's father was initially unimpressed by this unspectacular orchid, but after closer inspection, he was able to appreciate why he had just driven hundreds of miles to see it.
